¹ The Gender Development Index (GDI) measures gender gaps in human development achievements by accounting for disparities between women and men in three basic dimensions; health, knowledge and living standards; and is calculated for 167 countries. Countries are distributed into five groups based on the absolute deviation from gender parity in HDI values and Lebanon ranks 92 and comes under Group 5.

² The Gender Inequality Index (GII) expose differences in the distribution of achievements between women and men. It measures the human development costs of gender inequality, the higher the GII value the more disparities exist between females and males. GII is calculated for 162 countries, while Lebanon ranks at 96.

³ The Global Gender Gap index benchmarks national gender gaps on economic, education, health and political criteria and provides country rankings that allow for effective comparisons across regions and income groups. The rankings are designed to create global awareness of the challenges posed by gender gaps and the opportunities created by reducing them. http://www3.weforum.org/docs/WEF_GGGR_2020.pdf Lebanon ranked 140 over 149 countries in 2018 and with a score of 0.595; 137 over 144 countries and with a score of 0.596 in 2017; 135 over 144 countries and with a score of 0.598 in 2016
